Just to make sure they don't grow legs and walk away, please remember to bring them back to us when you're done! If you are brand new to the game, I suggest coming to the beginner hours to get acclimated. For those who have played for a while, thank you for being patient with those who are still learning. We were all beginners once! Advanced hours are open to everyone, but the level is higher at those times. For the sake of both the quality of play and the safety of all, make sure that you are comfortable at that pace. And finally, I cordially invite those who have only played pickleball here in Kirtland to check out some of our other activities and classes as well!



I hate using the phrase "blank-years-young." If it would apply to anyone, it would be to Dorothy. But rather than diminish the importance of her age and wisdom, she will tell you that she is a strong and proud 92-year-old woman. She was born in Concord, the middle of nine children. This tenacious lady is the only one of her siblings who is still with us, and not a day goes by that she isn't grateful for it. A favorite childhood memory is waiting for the plow trucks to come down the road. The youngsters would hide in the ditch, and let the plow push the snow over them. While she would not do that today, and I feel morally responsible to advise everyone to avoid said behavior, it remains a time that brings a mischievous glisten to her ever-twinkling eyes.

Every Saturday, you could find this mover and shaker at the Chesterland dance, where she met her eventual husband, Don. Throughout their 56 year marriage, these two did everything all the time. If you have a minute (or eight), ask her about the tractor club and their weekend travel to shows! She also spent 14 years at the Burton Historical Society, where her love of people manifested itself into cooking meals with joy.

If you ask anyone who knows her (and you should. Right now. I'll wait.), they will tell you that Dorothy loves to love and loves to help. If someone drops something on the floor, try to stop her from picking it up first. As she told me, "I'm closer to the ground." Regardless of her height, she packs a punch by loving above her weight class. From making baby blankets to looking after "old people" to volunteering at her church and her Center, this gal is constantly on the move.

Dorothy lives with her 66-year-old son Daniel, but you better believe that she will not let him help in her flower beds. While she grudgingly allows him to mow the lawn, her flowers are a point of well deserved pride. Weeds have no place in her world, and she will attack them with a vigor I can only strive for.

You can find her every Sunday morning with her chosen family at the Little Church in the Vale in Gates Mills. The community truly looks after each other, and called to make sure she was fine after she accidently slept in on Daylight Savings Day. We should all be so lucky to have people who care about us, and luckily you do. You may have not yet met, but you can bet your bottom dollar that Dorothy loves you.

Don, Dorothy's beloved husband, passed away 13 years ago, and she misses him terribly to this day. They were constant fixtures here at 7900 from the day we opened our doors. He would be in the front working the crowd, while she was rocking and rolling in the puzzle room. An institution at the Kirtland Senior Center, she assisted with the meal program when it was here and runs our weekly Bingo.

You ask Dorothy about herself, and she will tell you about everyone else. Not to be redundant, but from her mouth to your eyes (I'm consolidating for effect): "I just love all the people here. Everyone treats you like a person, not a number. I've met so many wonderful people - even if I don't know their names, I love them anyway. We need this place (editor's note: and all the people in it!). Everyone knows where to find me if they want to - in the puzzle room!"



When asked if she had any advice for all of y'all, she chose what she models. Help other people. Don't be selfish. If anyone needs help, get up and do it. Treat everyone nicely, no matter what. She's been living this way for 90+ years. I'm still trying to figure out how, but I have another 50+ to go to catch up to her.

She does warn us though - she is stubborn. Although she always walks away rather than fights, she did say that if something needs to be dug up, she's got her shovel. I think she was referring to gardening, but one can never be too careful.

I asked her what she wanted to be when she grows up, and she said, "I just want to be me." Well, Dorothy, I can speak for all of us and say that we're glad you are. Thanks for the hugs!
