




FROM THE DESK OF THE MAYOR

It's that time of year again in Northeast Ohio - construction season. In Kirtland we have no shortage of projects that will be happening this year. As we all know, the bridge that makes passage over the East Branch of the Chagrin possible will be under construction well into fall. The Old Town sewer project is back under way, disrupting movement about the neighborhood. And, thanks to the City Council's passage of our budget, nearly twenty streets will see road improvements of one sort or another this season.

These types of projects impede morning commutes, can disrupt peace and quiet, and often test our nerves. But the odd paradox is, work of this type doesn't just test our patience, but improves our neighborhoods and is necessary to maintain a functioning society. Not to mention that every street that sees improvement helps to quell the natives.



We all grew up watching TV shows and movies featuring skirmishes or peace deals between the "Indians" and the "White Man." And of course, these engagements nearly always featured swaggering sheriffs or immaculately dressed soldiers pitted against actors playing "Indians" donning plumes of feathered head dresses and covered in war paint. As I read Ambrose's documentation of the period, it was obvious that rarely were these portrayals representative of the way things happened on the plains, prairie, and mountains of the American West.

The "Indian question," as it was so often called, was the central conflict in a seemingly unbridled western expansion that included mad gold rushes, industrialists vying for railroad expansions, and wagon trains of settlers (often immigrants), all racing into an incomprehensibly vast landscape and wilderness. Further complicating the issue was the fact that tens of thousands of disaffected soldiers, like Custer, that had just finished an interminably bloody Civil War were now being asked to lead expeditions to tame or eradicate the "savages."

Ultimately, the book closes with the infamous Battle at Little Bighorn. The disastrous outcome to the American side was the culmination of several key blunders made by Custer that fateful day in June of 1876. Known as his last stand, Custer and his men were outnumbered at least ten to one and had to ascend a large hill in the face of thousands of well positioned and better armed Sioux warriors. Crazy Horse, leader of the Sioux that day, had perfectly executed his plans while the way Custer led his men into a battle gave the military zero chance to win.

It is worth an argument that perhaps the day should have been named Crazy Horse's Last Stand, not Custer's. Although Crazy Horse easily survived the battle, that day was the last time any formidable alliances amongst tribes had come together to repel the scourge of American expansion. Thus, over the next few years, the "Indian question" was over, and tens of thousands of Natives were relegated to what would become known as Indian Reservations.

As was the case again this month, sitting down to write these monthly notes in the Senior newsletter, I rarely have a plan and just start typing. So, if this month wasn't what you were looking for, try back in May and perhaps I'll have found subject matter that suits just the type of useless information you are looking for. ~ Mayor Potter

SENIOR SPOTLIGHT



For a time recently, the Center was a bit gloomier. I was trying to figure out what I was doing wrong, when it hit me. We hadn't seen Heidi in a while. Luckily, she's back, and bringing her joy and energy into every room.

Heidi Egensperger was born in West Berlin, Germany. Her parents lived through World War II, and made the decision to immigrate to the U.S. when she was 3. Shortly after, they moved to Willowick, where she spent a Willowickian childhood. Heidi went through the local school system, and became a citizen when she was seven years old. As she put it, she walked to school every day. Barefoot, uphill both ways. Granted, they lived within a stone's throw of the building, but it was a character-builder nonetheless. Her parents were both professional tailors, and her father one of the original 700 Fussy Tailors (which is apparently a well-known Cleveland thing).

Always one who wanted to help others, she went to Bowling Green as a pre-med student. When her father fell ill, she sacrificed her dream of being a doctor to fulfill the reality of caring for her loved one. In lieu of eight more years of schooling, she stayed closer to home and became a medical tech. What does a medical tech do, you ask? So did I. She found her

footing working in hospitals, making her way from a chemistry supervisor to an assistant lab manager to a lab manager. So this particular med tech made things happen. Eventually she ran a lab of sixty women and one man. In all humility, I ask you to spare a thought for Paul, brave man that he was.

After ten years in the hospital system, she made the move into industry, working with a company that makes chemical analyzers. Her answer to my question of "what does a chemical analyzer do?" was akin to "analyzes chemicals." Fair enough. This company became her home for the next fifteen years, while moving her actual home to Rochester, Connecticut, and Boston, amongst others. One of her last positions was working with 22 hospitals within the Mass General healthcare system. On the list of jobs that you don't even know exist, but would know if they didn't, she became the liaison for every department so they could work seamlessly to provide the most positive patient impact. The best part of the position was the opportunity to train others around the country. While her youthful dreams of becoming a doctor never panned out, she was given the chance to make a larger impact on patients throughout Mass General, and the country.

I always ask nomads where was their favorite place to live. The unequivocal answer was Hampton Falls, New Hampshire. To give you a glimpse into this town of 1,600, Heidi and her then-husband were unanimously chosen as "hog reeves" upon their arrival. This vital appointed position was a one year assignment. They were assigned long prods and instructed to respond if anyone's hogs escaped. Their glamorous job was to corral the fugitives and return them safely to their owners. While this was a real job, the newcomers soon realized that no hogs actually resided in Hampton Falls, and fulfilled their responsibilities with no incident. And now you have an idea of how New Hampshire humor manifests itself. Live free or die! Other than the obvious lack of hogs, this lovely little town right on the water, and the combination of seafood restaurants and sea breezes (the actual weather, not the drinks) made for a peaceful environment.

As a young whippersnapper, her family would vacation in Phoenix in the summer months which, everyone knows, is the best time to go to Arizona. These early memories led to a lifetime love of the southwest, especially the Four Corners (where Arizona, New Mexico, Utah, and Colorado meet). She developed a deep appreciation for Native culture, and has spent time on several reservations around the country. This fun-loving blond was not all work and no play. Filling her spare time with downhill skiing, horseback riding, hiking, and kayaking, Heidi has always been a nature-lover. Her best times now are spent on the water. Since moving back to the area in 2001, she has found a family at the Great Lakes Cruising Club. As Mentor's Port Captain, she takes care of those passing through our local waters.

While sadly I'm not including a picture, I really love that Heidi's cat Louie recently embarked on a month-long road trip in her small RV. Ever seen someone taking a cat for a walk on a leash? It may just have been Heidi. Between traveling, ebiking, and continuing to enjoy nature, Heidi fills her days with creating stories and lasting memories.

Before we part, allow her to climb up on her soapbox for a moment. A two-time survivor of cancer and a staunch supporter of The Gathering Place in Beachwood, Heidi encourages everyone to embrace preventative care. Find a primary care physician that will spend the time with you that you deserve, and advocate for yourself. If something seems wrong, make sure you ask the questions.

We did spend a good amount of time praising the virtues of the City of Faith and Beauty. A resident for over twenty years, she loves the small town feel, not being asked to wrangle hogs, her neighbors, and tending her vegetable garden. Convinced by a friend to come here to the Center, you can see her playing chair volleyball, trying to learn chess, figuring her way through pickleball, and joining us on bus trips.

If you need advice on how to advocate for yourself, ask Heidi. If you want to know the best way to recuperate after being thrown off a horse, she's your gal. If you need an updated harbor report, she'll be here most every weekday. And if you are ever looking to spend time with someone who has survived the hard and celebrated the good, you're in luck. And so are we.
