### WHY ALL THE TRAFFIC STOPS???

Residents reached out numerous times during the year and requested additional traffic enforcement in various areas within the city. We took these concerns to heart and made 3,539 traffic stops in 2023. This number represents an increase of 1,100 traffic stops from 2022. The violations we stopped for ranged from minor traffic infractions like two working headlights all the way to speeding, which was the residents' biggest concern. I wanted to let our seniors know that the Kirtland Police Department remains committed to the community and keeping the roads safe for vehicular and pedestrian traffic.

If you are experiencing traffic issues or concerns in your neighborhood, feel free to reach out to the police department. We will be happy to discuss the problems and try to create a plan to address the issues. If you are interested in seeing more statistics, the police department will be publishing the 2023 annual report near the end of February. It will be available on the city website under the police department's annual reports tab.

### SENIOR BOARD MEMBERS



# **SENIOR SPOTLIGHT**



What were you doing on Saturday, September 18, 2021? (This is me asking, not the Police Chief.) It was a beautiful sunny day - I have pictures to prove it. And although it may sound creepy, I can also tell you exactly what Diane Castrataro was doing that day. It was her 55th birthday, and she and her husband Joe were enjoying lunch. As they drove home, Joe suggested that they stop at the Senior Center to check it out, because she was officially eligible now. I can practically see the look she gave him. But stop they did, and peered in through those glass windows. There was a sign on the door for our clam bake, although the cut-off was the day before. As fate would have it, I was just pulling out and wondered who these people were and if they were planning on casing the joint. Being the observant person I am, I stopped to ask them if they needed anything. Half an hour later, they were new members, signed up (after the cut-off) for the clam bake, and I was late to my own birthday celebration.
