Each year when Kiwanis begins to ramp up for the Strawberry Festival, I can't help but think about what a festival like ours would have been a century or more ago? Instead of carnival rides, perhaps there would there have been someone in a suit jacket, donning tails and wearing a top hat yelling "step right up, step right up to guess the weight of the world's largest Strawberry." Invariably when I think of carnivals from those days, my mind resets to old movies and shows that depicted so many of the characters as hucksters. And as soon as I hear the word huckster, I think of the greatest of all time.

We all know Phineas Taylor Barnum. Of course, American lore remembers him as PT Barnum. PT, renowned as the quintessential hoaxster and one of the most astounding businessmen of the 19th century, still reigns in our minds as the greatest showman on Earth. Barnum's innate sense of "what the people want to see" and even more importantly to PT, "what will they fall for while paying for it?" is rivaled by maybe no one in American history. After all, Barnum did coin the phrase "A sucker is born every minute."

After decades of moderate rises, precipitous failures, and then huge successes, Barnum tried his hand at clock making. In 1852, Barnum began the Terry and Barnum Manufacturing Company and moved the Litchfield Clock Company to East Bridgeport Connecticut. This time, PT disguised his motive as a civically minded enterprise designed to help working families obtain jobs and property ownership.

Then in 1855, an acquaintance, Chauncey Jerome, paid the ever-intellectually curious and venturous Barnum a visit. Jerome, of the Jerome Clock Company, planted a seed that his world-famous clock manufacturing company would be an ideal candidate for Barnum's growing East Bridgeport. The Jerome company thought that the Barnum brainchild and new town of East Bridgeport was the perfect candidate for a proposed migration. PT could not resist. Or rather, Barnum the swindler turned swindled and took the bait. Falling hook line and sinker, Phineas Taylor Barnum lent his credit worthy name to Jerome. The once prosperous Jerome had overextended his clock manufacturing company and was peddling bait and switch promissory notes with banks and independent financiers far and wide. Barnum's fortune was swallowed up and the clock companies failed.

Barnum left manufacturing for good and returned to the world of nonsense and sleight of hand. The outrageously clever and always deft at turning a buck Barnum, took just several years to clear his name and remount his fortune in the world of carnival barkers and fire eating musclemen.

All this talk about zany entertainment and old-world carnivals, leading up to the June 15th-17th Strawberry Festival, I can't help but think how much fun it would be to see Tom Dice or Bill Wright standing in front of a giant pit of Strawberries, heckling the crowd and saying "Step right, step right up to watch Councilmen Smolic and Haymer duke it out in a winner takes all strawberry wrestling contest!" SENIOR SPOTLIGHT



There are people in this Center that I have no recollection of meeting. Logically, there must have been an initial introduction, potentially awkward small talk, and an insistence that we require the same paperwork for everyone, regardless of how onerous. I can certainly pinpoint those conversations with several people. This month's Senior Spotlight, however, must have skipped all of that. I have no recollection of meeting Jim Ruttinger for the first time. At least for me, that small talk must have been pleasant and the required paperwork was completed without a question or complaint. In my mind, Jim has always been a part of

our Kirtland family since we re-opened and I don't want to imagine us without him!

Jim was born in the snowy world of Buffalo, NY (I presume - unless he was born in the summer...). His father was a mechanical engineer and when his company built a new plant in Hickman, Kentucky, the family made the arduous journey down south. Their new home was right on the Mississippi, and at the tender age of 11, it wasn't difficult to make new friends. Living in the country now meant that Jim could have a pony and pony cart. His name was Gray Boy. Not sure if they named the cart. Soon after he graduated to a horse, Ginger. This may sound like I'm singing the praises of small town living, because I am. When a neighbor's daughter crashed her Volkswagen Beetle, he bought the carcass for \$50, and the love of mechanics passed down from father to son. At a mere 15 years old, Jim took the body off of the Beetle and rebuilt it into a dune buggy. Right about this time, the dune buggy craze was beginning, and adding roll bars to these "unsophisticated" rides made sanctioned racing a bit more safe.

Jim's official education continued at Murray State University in Kentucky, eventually earning a degree in chemistry and landing a job at the BF Goodrich Chemical Company in Calvert City. While he was there, he became reacquainted with a friend from college. She had worked in Tennessee before moving over to BF Goodrich, and these once-friends landed at the altar in 1980. Mary Jane is another fixture here at the Center, and we're all sure glad that these two found each other again!

Mary Jane and Jim raised their two children in Paducah, Kentucky. His seventeen year career in Calvert City ended when he transferred to a plant in Bainbridge. On second thought, you should probably just ask him. He and his buggy (which should have a name) very kindly represent the Kirtland Senior Center at the Strawberry Festival parade. You are invited to hoot and holler on June 16 when you see him cruising through Kirtland.

As with many of our members, I have no idea how Jim ever had time to have a fulltime job. He has always been into bicycling, and rode from Pittsburgh to D.C. in six days. For real - I pack snacks if I drive more than half an hour. He is also a woodworker, and has been volunteering at Holden Arboretum and the Botanical Gardens as a carpenter. You should also ask him about leaf litter baskets, because I had never heard of them and they really are cool.

Jim and Mary Jane have been married for 42 years, and their two and a half year old grandson in Shaker Heights keeps them on their toes. Their daughter in L.A. gives them an excuse to travel. And his 1972 Karmann Ghia VW gives him a reason to keep tinkering. Pickleball lessons taught him the right way to play back in 2022, and he is improving on the courts every day. I'm sure Debbie and Ken's instructions still ring true 15 months later, and he finds inspiration in a daily pickleball email.
