

SR 306 Multi-Purpose Path and Pedestrian Bridge

In December of 2010, the Northeast Ohio Areawide Coordinating Agency (NOACA) selected the State Route 306 Multi-Purpose Path and Pedestrian Bridge Project for funding. This project is part of the long range Comprehensive Plan for the City of Kirtland.

The \$600,000 grant, awarded through the Transportation Enhancement Program and administered by ODOT, will substantially fund the first phase of the project. This phase will include construction of a multipurpose path on State Route 306 from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints to just beyond the intersection of Rt. 615 and Rt. 306.

The project will also include construction of a pedestrian bridge over the East Branch of the Chagrin River. The eventual intent is to construct a multi-purpose path that extends from Lakeland Community College to Lake Metroparks Penitentiary Glen in Kirtland.



Lakeland Community College Expands

Lakeland Community College has entered into an agreement with a private developer to lease a building across from Lakeland's campus. The building will be approximately 40,000 sq. ft. and will be built on 3.3 acres at the northwest corner of State Route 306 and Kirtland Road.

The space will be utilized as a University Center, allowing for partnership programs with local four-year universities to give students an opportunity to earn a bachelor's degree at Lakeland.

It will also provide additional classroom space to the community college. The partnerships will benefit students by providing opportunities to earn advanced degrees close to home and allowing students access to services from Lakeland and the university partners. The partnership program also allows the universities to cut costs because Lakeland is providing the facility.

The building will provide approximately sixteen additional classrooms and two biology labs. The project is expected to be completed by fall 2011.

Cleveland Magazine Ranks Kirtland 8th

Cleveland Magazine ranked the City of Kirtland 8th out of 77 communities in Northeastern Ohio.

The magazine features a special edition each year that rates the suburbs of Cleveland.

Safety, education, housing, taxes, environment, community services, and overall quality of life are considered in the review process.

Kirtland is proud to receive this recognition.

Sewer Update

The SR 306 sewer project, under the direction of the Lake County Commissioners and Lake County Department of Utilities, is continuing to make progress. Completion is expected this summer.

Last summer, they completed the required boring to install pipe under Interstate 90. Construction on the Markell Road Pump Station, which will service Kirtland's downtown area, is currently underway. They are also working on installing necessary pipe along SR 306.

This project will not only provide essential services, but offer an opportunity to pursue economic development.

The Temple View Pump Station (a separate sewer project) was completed last fall. This station was constructed behind Kirtland City Hall and will tie into the new sewers on SR 306.

In 1990, the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency found bacteria in the East Branch of the Chagrin River and the Lake County Health Department traced it to the Temple View subdivision. More than half of the septic systems in this subdivision are failing. The new pump station will provide service for 52 homes. The City was awarded \$492,897 in federal stimulus (American Recovery and Reinvestment Act aka ARRA) money for the project via the Ohio EPA Water Pollution Control Loan Fund.

Grants Provide Funds for Projects and Equipment



The City of Kirtland continues to proactively pursue available grants. Within the past year, we have been awarded over \$1.5 million in grant funding to pursue necessary projects and new equipment.

Assistance to Firefighters Grant - \$90,000

Our 1967 grass fire truck was retired from service and the grant was applied toward the purchase of a new grass fire truck (see photo above).

Assistance to Firefighters Grant - \$155,012

The grant will be applied toward the purchase of an upgraded radio system for the Kirtland Fire Department.

In October of 2011, all communities within Lake County will be required to upgrade the current radio system utilized by their safety forces.

The City of Kirtland police and fire departments will be required to replace all mobile and portable radios and associated equipment. The estimated cost to the City is \$286,000.

NOPEC Grant - \$55,500

Another grant for the purchase of police department radios was just awarded and will provide an additional \$55,500.

OPWC Grant for Tibbetts Road - \$199,500

The grant will be used to repave and improve drainage on Tibbetts Road. Work is scheduled to begin during the summer of 2011.

Ohio EPA Water Pollution Control Loan Fund (ARRA – Federal Stimulus Funds) - \$492,897

The grant was applied toward the construction of the Temple View Pump Station. The station will service the homes in the Temple View subdivision.

NOACA Grant - \$600,000

The grant will be applied toward the construction of the SR 306 Multi-Purpose Path and Pedestrian Bridge.

Brush Collection

For more information please contact the Service Department at 256-1234.

On April 4, the Kirtland Service Department will begin brush pick-up throughout the city.

The program is intended to assist residents with the annual spring cleanup of branches and twigs that have come down from the inclement winter weather. The program is NOT intended to assist with clearing a parcel or substantially clearing trees on a parcel.

The trucks will pass only one time through each ward, so please have your brush and tree limbs out by the date listed for your ward.

REQUIREMENTS FOR BRUSH PICK-UP

- Brush should be placed at the edge of the road and not in the drainage ditches.
- Brush should not exceed three inches in diameter or a maximum of six feet in length.
- Brush must be piled or bundled.
- The entire brush pile must not exceed 25 feet wide (maximum).
- Unacceptable items include stumps, shrubs, and Christmas trees.

Street Repairs

Each spring our Public Works Department evaluates the condition of all roadways in the City of Kirtland. All necessary repairs are noted and a priority list for repairs is then established. Every effort is made to address all issues as expeditiously as possible.

Upcoming Road Construction

TIBBETTS ROAD

Work will be underway this summer to improve drainage and repave Tibbetts Road from Rt. 6 to the Chesterland border. If possible, please avoid this road while it is under construction.

SPERRY at RT. 6

Work will be underway this spring to reprofile and resurface Rt. 6, west of Sperry to provide better visibility. A temporary red light will be established and traffic contained to one lane. Those traveling through this intersection should consider an alternate route. Sperry will be closed from Dewey/Gem, north to Rt. 6 and from Billings Road, south to Rt. 6. There will be no access to Sperry from Rt. 6, either north or south. Residents should use Heath Road or Wisner Road as a detour.

AAA Platinum Safety Award

The Kirtland Police Department is pleased to announce that we have received the AAA Platinum Safety Award for the eighth year in a row.

We are proud of this award because it reflects a collective effort between our safety forces, Engineering and the Public Works Department. The process by which we attained this honor is what we refer to as the three E's - **Engineering**, **Enforcement** and **Education**.



Engineering is essential to safety. For example, our Public Works Department can fill in roadside ditches to reduce injury accidents and prevent car rollovers. Another example is the placement of guardrails and safety related signs.

Enforcement is an important component of the overall approach and used in areas with the highest injury accident rate. This approach is known as selective enforcement and helps to reduce accidents.

Education is provided through various programs within the city. From reinforcing the importance of wearing a seatbelt through "Click It or Ticket" to teaching high school students about drinking and driving through "Mixers and Shakers," student participation in our schools is vital to reinforcing safe driving practices. The Fire Department is also available to help families install child restraint seats properly.

Contacting the Police

Reaching the Police Department for emergencies is as easy as dialing 9-1-1. Our Fire Department may also be reached via 9-1-1 as our dispatch center services both police and fire.

If you call 9-1-1 from a cell phone, your call will go through the Central Dispatch at the Emergency Operating Center. They will "patch" you through to the Kirtland Police Dispatch. Should you need police or fire for any nonemergency situation, please use the alternate number of 440-256-3333. This number is a direct line to our dispatch center in the Kirtland Police Department.

It is important for us and for the safety of the community to keep the 9-1-1 lines open for emergency calls only.

Power Outages

In the event of a power outage, we suggest that you contact **First Energy** directly at **1-888-LIGHTSS** (1-888-544-4877).

You are welcome to call our dispatch, but we are unable to provide updates on the progress or time frames for repair. We are limited to passing on the information to the electric company.

When emergencies arise, our ability to serve the community is often disrupted due to the high call volume. Calling the power company directly helps them to direct their resources more efficiently and provide faster service.

Please make certain that your vehicles are in good working order with appropriate mufflers and license plates (both front and rear) and that all of your equipment, including lights, are operating properly. It is important for your safety and the safety of others using the highways.

Improvements at City Recreation Park

Recreation Park is maintained by the City of Kirtland Service Department. In addition to cutting the grass, striping the fields and other required routine maintenance, the park is regularly evaluated for repairs and upgrades that will improve the facilities.

During the last year the following repairs and upgrades have been made:

• Expansion of the Parking Lot

To accommodate more vehicles, the parking lot was expanded. As funds become available, the expanded areas will be asphalted and striped. Handicapped parking was also extended west of the concession stand. A drop-off area was also created to provide a safe place for individuals to exit a vehicle and to improve traffic flow.

Extension of the Split Rail Fencing
 Unfortunately, we have
 experienced an ongoing issue of
 vehicles traveling onto the fields
 and causing damage. The split rail
 fencing was extended to prevent
 damage from unauthorized

vehicles driving on the fields. We encourage all visitors to park in designated areas. We need to ensure that safety vehicles can easily access the park in case of an emergency.

Repairs to the Bleachers

A routine inspection last fall indicated that the bleachers required repairs to keep them safe for use. The Service Department promptly removed the bleachers, made necessary repairs and will return the bleachers this spring.

Bathrooms Repainted

All bathrooms near the concession stand were repainted.

Improved Drainage

Catch basins were installed to improve drainage on the fields.

We recognize that the community values the use of this land and we are committed to ensuring that the space is safe and well maintained.



The city has been focusing on ways to increase energy efficiency.

Last fall, we replaced the windows in the west wing of the Kirtland Community and Senior Center.

The old windows were original to the building. The new windows will reduce energy loss, allow for easy ventilation and make the rooms more comfortable for use.

We are currently working toward a comprehensive energy audit at no charge to the city. Based on that evaluation, we will pursue further grant funding to increase our energy efficiency and reduce our energy costs.

Garage Sale Permits

Residents are required to obtain a garage sale permit. A sale may be held for a maximum of four (4) days. A resident may not hold a sale more than twice per year and must apply separately for a permit for each sale. The cost of the permit is \$3.

Applications are available in the Finance Department at Kirtland City Hall - 9301 Chillicothe Road. A name, address and the dates of the sale are required at the time of application.

NOPEC

Electric and Natural Gas

What is NOPEC?

Under Ohio law, local governments may form an aggregation or buying group. There are 126 member communities (including Kirtland) in Northeast Ohio, having formed the Northeast Ohio Public Energy Council (NOPEC). Voters authorized this action beginning in the November 2000 Election. NOPEC negotiates the purchase of natural gas and electricity on behalf of residents within these communities, typically extending a discount on these commodities by purchasing in aggregate.

How did I become enrolled in NOPEC?

If you live in a NOPEC community, you are automatically included, unless you choose not to be. Ohio has what is called an "opt-out" procedure. This means that all eligible customers of an aggregated community become part of the buying group unless they take specific action to opt out of the aggregation. Opt-out notices are sent to every eligible natural gas consumer every two years.

Under Ohio law (SB221) electricity customers may receive an opt-out notice every three years.

Consumers who wish to leave before the end of the gas program may do so without charge. Consumers who wish to leave the electric program before the end of NOPEC's contract period will be subject to a cancellation fee.

<u>How can I compare NOPEC to offers from other energy suppliers?</u>

For natural gas customers, the Public utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO) publishes an "Apples to Apples" chart available at www.puco.ohio.gov.

Babysitting Basics




