Dear Residents of Kirtland,

I wanted to share some thoughts with you on three topics: the 2016 road plan, our Boards and Commissions, and working for change with our neighbors.



After passing the 2016 budget, I presented City Council with a paving and road maintenance program for the season. Our mission continues to be to repair, resurface, and rebuild the streets of the city, while maximizing the value for the residents by applying the proper method of paving, including hot mix asphalt, chip and seal, or micro-surfacing based on the circumstances of each road. Wrenwood, Martin, Killdeer, and Eagle Road (east) are complete or near completion. I was very pleased with the work our city crews did on Eagle Road (east) with the hot mix asphalt. I was less pleased with the contracted work we had done on Martin Road, and will be looking at a vendor change going forward as a result. Eagle Road (west) and Worrell Road are the next connector roads which will be done this year. The centerline grinding and patching work on 306 is near completion, and will allow for the planned spraying of the centerlines.

Our Boards and Commissions do important work for the city. We are fortunate to have excellent leadership on both our Planning and Zoning Commission in its Chairman Mike Denk, and on the Board of Zoning Appeals with its President Marvin Bahr. These leaders run thoughtful, organized meetings which bring excellent value to the residents. I hope when you next get the chance, you mention your appreciation to these gentlemen, as well as all the members of the P&Z and BZA for their work.

Finally, I wanted to inform the residents about the efforts of the administration, the council, and a number of impacted residents on the topic of skeet shooting.

- Proof of residency is **REQUIRED** (i.e. drivers' license or utility bill).
- Staples and paper clips do not need to be removed in advance.
- Limit of 3 bankers size boxes per household. A banker's box (15x12x10) is approximately the same size as a copy paper box for standard letter size paper.
- Please bring documents in a container that can be discarded.
- If you intend to witness your documents being shredded, please be prepared to wait. Shredding is done on a first-come, first-served basis.

Don't Forget to Fall Back - Nov. 6

Get ready for earlier sunrises ... and earlier sunsets.

Sunday, November 6, 2016 - Daylight Saving Time ends at 2:00 a.m. Remember to set your clocks back one hour before you go to bed on Saturday night.

The Kirtland Fire Department encourages residents to change the batteries in their smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors when they change their clocks. A working smoke detector more than doubles a person's chance of surviving a home fire.



Road Update

City of Kirtland road crews are busy wrapping up several big projects before winter comes. Crews will continue patching and repairing various streets throughout the City until the asphalt plants close for the season.

The chart below is an update to the Kirtland 2016 Road Plan showing the status of road projects. In addition to the plan, centerline repair on Route 306 is complete. Road striping will continue in the next couple of months on Route 306 south of Eagle Road & Eagle Road west.

Lake County Storm Water Management will also be making repairs to the storm sewer pipe under the road at Recreation Park in the late fall. They will also begin the design phase for crossover repair on north Raccoon Hill.

We realize that construction delays can be frustrating. Thank you for your patience and understanding as workers continue to make many roadway improvements throughout Kirtland.

Kirtland Recreation & Senior Center Renewal Levy

The Kirtland Recreation and Senior Levy is due for renewal this fall. This levy came into existence during the tenure of Mayor Marcopoli and still serves the community today. The levy provides funding for the Community and Senior Center as well as maintenance and upkeep of Recreation Park. Levy funds are used to prepare and improve youth baseball, soccer, and football fields throughout their seasons. Funding also subsidizes Junior Olympics, Safety Town, the Egg Hunt, Pancakes with Santa, and the Preschool Halloween Carnival. The Community Center supports Election Day, Bloodmobiles, Kiwanis meetings and events, holiday food collection and distribution for the Kirtland Area Service Council, as well as being home to many Kirtland scout groups and 4-H clubs. Youth sports in-season use the gym for practices and homeowners associations meet throughout the year. Adults 55 and over have a full schedule of activities at the Community and Senior Center, weekdays until 3:00 p.m. These activities keep Kirtland's older adults moving, socializing, and engaged in their community for an optimum quality of life. Weekend rental rates remain subsidized for Kirtland residents with ample space for rentals all year round.

A renewal levy allows the taxing district to keep a current levy on the books and collect the same amount of money as when the original levy was voted in. The renewal levy is NOT a new tax or tax increase.

Lake County's New Reverse 911 System

The Lake County Emergency Management Agency (EMA) strongly encourages all residents to register for the county's mass notification system, VESTA Alert.

Lake County residents who register may receive alerts about developing or existing emergency conditions such as natural hazards, evacuation orders, crime prevention, major road closures, and other important public safety information. Alerts will only be sent for emergencies.

Those who wish to register for the new system must enter a valid street address and have the option of registering a landline phone for voice notification, cell phone for voice and/or text alerts, or an email address for more detailed text alerts. If you have registered in the past, you are encouraged to update your information in the new system.

The incorporation of this new system represents Lake County EMA's continuing commitment to providing our citizens with the most advanced technologies available to ensure that our local public safety is as effective as possible.

WINTER DRIVING TIPS

It is inevitable that the first snow of winter will bring accidents. After several months of good weather and clear roads, most drivers need to become re-acclimated with driving in winter conditions. The following are some tips and reminders to help keep you and your family safe this winter.

Driving safely on icy roads:

- Decrease your speed and allow at least three times more space than usual between you and the car in front of you.
- Brake gently to avoid skidding. If your wheels lock up, ease off the brake.
- Turn on your lights to increase your visibility to other motorists.
- Keep your lights and windshield clean.
- Use low gears to keep traction, especially on hills.
- Don't use cruise control or overdrive on icy roads.
- Be especially careful on bridges, overpasses, and infrequently traveled roads which will freeze first. If the conditions are wet, even at temperatures above freezing, you might encounter ice in shady areas or on exposed roadways like bridges.
- Don't pass snow plows. The drivers have limited visibility and you're likely to find the road in front of them worse than the road behind.
- Don't assume your vehicle can handle all conditions. Even four-wheel and front-wheel drive vehicles can encounter trouble on winter roads.

If your rear wheels skid:

- Take your foot off the accelerator.
- Steer in the direction that you want the front wheels to go. If your rear wheels are sliding left, steer left. If they are sliding right, steer right.
- If your rear wheels start sliding the opposite direction (as you recover), ease the steering wheel toward that side. You may steer left and right a few times to get your vehicle completely under control.
- If you have standard brakes, pump them gently.
- If you have anti-lock brakes (ABS), do not pump the brakes. Apply steady pressure to the brakes. You will feel the brakes pulse – this is normal.

If your front wheels skid:

- Take your foot off the gas and shift into neutral, but don't try to immediately steer.
- As the wheels skid sideways, they will slow the vehicle and traction will return. As it returns, steer in the direction you want to go, shift into drive, and accelerate gently.

Snow Plowing Reminder

As we approach winter, please remember that depositing snow on streets is strictly prohibited by City of Kirtland Ordinance §412.06.

The intent of this ordinance is to eliminate hazards created by leaving ridges of snow in the street, creating sight hazards with large piles of snow, and blocking ditches which impedes the normal flow of water. If you see this happening, please report it to the Kirtland Police Department at 440-256-3333.

Anyone who violates this ordinance may be subject to a fine.

Snow Parking Ban

Our city plows work hard to keep your streets safe. Please help them by remembering the snow parking ban whenever the snow exceeds two inches during a period of 24 hours or less.



NEWS FROM THE FIRE & POLICE DEPARTMENTS

Kirtland Fire Department Receives New Equipment

The Kirtland Fire Department received \$131,300 in State, Federal, and Ohio Bureau of Workers Compensation Grants to upgrade equipment.

The grants will include three Stryker Power Cots and Load systems, three "state of the art" Stair Chairs, and one CAMEL patient lifting device.

All of the equipment is designed to improve efficiency and reduce firefighter injuries. Each of the fire department's three ambulances will be outfitted with the power cots, load system and stair chair. The lifting device will be carried on the chase vehicle.

A new medium-duty ambulance will be ordered in September. The new unit will be manufactured by the McCoy-Miller Corporation, and will be the nearly identical to our 2011 McCoy-Miller ambulance. The cost of the unit is \$199,280, through the State of Ohio Procurement Program.

Preventative Measures from Chief Baumgart

DRIVING: Now that we are leaving the summer months and heading into fall please be vigilant for school traffic both walking and driving. The school zone signs may give you warning, however, it is important to drive safely even when they are not in operation. There are many activities going on at all times around our school campus. We all love supporting our Hornets football at home games. Please drive with care during game time.

Regarding driving make certain that your vehicle is well maintained and ready for the weather ahead. Unsafe vehicles can cause accidents. Check that all your lights are working properly, fluids are filled (including windshield cleaner), tires are safe, and the brakes are adequate. Do not drink and drive, text and drive or partake in any activity that will distract you from the obligation of driving safely. We want all drivers to be safe.

The Kirtland Police Department participates in many programs such as "Click it or Ticket" and "Drive Sober or get Pulled Over" to help others stay aware of the need for safety. We can all make a difference in the safety record of our city by working together for the mutual benefit of all travelers.

SCAMS: Many of our residents have been confronted with several attempts to scam money. Never give any personal information to any stranger over a phone, in person or by mail. Scam calls and messages are usually sent out in volume hoping that a percentage of the recipients will respond. Many of these scams are very sophisticated and may even have official looking logos of banks or other entities that you have done business with in the past or present. You should always contact the bank using a publicized phone number and not the one given by the scammers in order to determine if the letter or phone call was legitimate. An ounce of prevention is easily performed. Generally speaking; if it sounds too good to be true it probably isn't. If you have received calls from someone claiming to be from the IRS or a similar branch of government threatening to "bring charges" against you do not fall for these. Please do not hesitate to call the police if you have any questions or concerns. In most of these cases we cannot necessarily find the culprit, but we can help you to not be a victim.

ISSUE # 1

Kirtland Recreation & Senior Center Renewal Levy

WHAT IS ISSUE #1?

Issue #1 is a 0.85 Mill Renewal Levy which supports the Kirtland Community Center, Senior Center, and the Recreation Park. The previously approved levy expires at the end of this year.

IS ISSUE #1 A TAX INCREASE?

NO - Issue #1 is a *renewal levy*. It is **NOT** a tax increase.

WHAT IS A RENEWAL LEVY?

A renewal levy allows the taxing district to keep a current levy on the books and collect the same amount of money as when the original levy was voted in.

HOW MUCH DOES THE LEVY COST?

Effective 2017, the cost per \$100,000 of home value:
