FALL/WINTER 2017



Fall 2017 has arrived in the City of Kirtland and it's a good time to reflect on what we have done in the last two years as we complete the current terms and anticipate a new City Council in December.

We executed infrastructure projects like the slope stabilization on Rt. 306, Elm St. drainage improvement project, Raccoon Hill Dr. drainage improvement, Recreation Park access road safety improvements, and installed additional sidewalks to connect neighborhoods. We partnered with local agencies and community organizations to get everything from stormwater funding to hanging flower baskets.

We authorized the purchase of needed fleet vehicles including an ambulance, a fire truck, several patrol cars, a new plow truck, and a rebuilt plow truck. Vehicles must be rotated to avoid obsolescence, despite a tight budget. These purchases provide the tools needed by our city employees to deliver critical services.

The administration proposed and council improved and approved the animal ordinance to protect residents particularly with respect to dangerous dogs, a law which has already been enforced by our Police Department.

We sought and initiated action to save money through contracts for natural gas and electricity for the city, and began the changeover to LED lighting equipment which will eventually include all city buildings. Additionally, we reviewed service contracts with neighboring communities and updated the terms.

Together we worked to get the right people in place to work for the city. We gave an appropriate send off to Chief Baumgart and swore in new Police Chief Lance Nosse. We also found dedicated people to fill roles on our important boards and commissions.

City Council and the administration are not done working during this term with the Community Reinvestment Area Ordinances, proposed changes to Chapter 1248 (Improvements) of our code, particularly typical new street construction, will soon be placed before Planning and Zoning.

With all our accomplishments, there remains plenty to do for City Council and we are committed to working together to find the revenue and efficiencies to sustain quality services.

Kirtland in State Top 50

Earlier this year, the City of Kirtland, along with the Police Department, received recognition from the State of Ohio, Governor John Kasich, and Lieutenant Governor Mary Taylor for being one of the Top 50 Safest Cities in the State of Ohio. Dustin Russell, Liaison for the Governor, met with Mayor Davidson, Chief Baumgart (retired), and Chief Nosse to present the recognition to the city on its hard work for keeping our community and residents safe.

Rain or shine, bring your documents to be shredded for **FREE!**

All Kirtland residents are welcome to bring up to three bankers size boxes.

- Proof of residency is **REQUIRED** (i.e. drivers' license or utility bill).
- Staples and paper clips do not need to be removed in advance.
- Limit of 3 bankers size boxes per household. A banker's box (15x12x10) is approximately the same size as a copy paper box for standard letter size paper.
- Please bring documents in a container that can be discarded.
- If you intend to witness your documents being shredded, please be prepared to wait. Shredding is done on a first-come, first-served basis.
- Newspapers, magazines, and electronic equipment (towers free of hard drives, keyboards, printers, and fax machine) will also be collected.
- Monitors and hard drives will **NOT** be accepted.

Outdoor Fall Cleanup

After all that hard work on your yard this summer, it's time for fall clean-up! What are you planning on doing with all those grass clippings, branches, huge piles of leaves, and other yard waste? Keep one thing in mind when disposing of your yard waste; never dump waste into the storm drain in the street or on the banks of a nearby stream! Anything in a storm sewer or stream will wash directly to Lake Erie, untreated! Try composting, using a mulching mower, or using your neighborhood yard waste collection dates. Recycle Your Christmas Tree

Each year Lake Metroparks offers convenient Christmas tree recycling drop-off locations throughout Lake County. Recycling Christmas trees helps the parks as they are chipped and the chips are then composted or used as mulch within Lake Metroparks.

Please remove all decorations before placing trees in designated bins. Tree bins are available at the parks beginning mid-December and will be removed about January 15.

Protect Lake Erie, Even in the Winter

Even though Lake Erie may freeze during the winter, we need to continue to protect its waters. Many things we do around our homes and on our driveways in the winter time effects Lake Erie's water quality, because whatever enters a storm drain or roadside ditch will eventually flow untreated to our rivers and end up in Lake Erie. Here are a few simple tips to follow this winter:

- ❖ Don't wait until spring rains wash all the winter gunk off your car; take it to a commercial carwash so that the salt residue, dirt, oil, grease, and break dust that built up on your car will drain to a sanitary sewer where the water can be treated.
- ❖ Use salt wisely, because a little goes a long way - apply salt to driveways and sidewalks **BEFORE** it snows to help prevent ice buildup; shovel as much snow as possible, and then apply salt when necessary; if there is salt remaining on your sidewalk or driveway after the ice melts, sweep it up and save it for the next snow storm; try to pile salt on grassy areas, not over catch basins or near streams, to minimize the amount of accumulated pollution in the snow, so when the snow melts, the grass will filter out the pollutants and it won't flow into waterways.

It may not seem like you alone can make a difference in cleaning up stormwater pollution, but if everyone in your community did these simple steps, it would have a great impact on Lake Erie. Snow Plowing Reminder

As we approach winter, please remember that pushing driveway snow or depositing snow on streets is strictly prohibited by City of Kirtland Ordinance §412.06.

The intent of this ordinance is to eliminate hazards created by leaving ridges of snow in the street, creating sight hazards with large piles of snow, and blocking ditches which impedes the normal flow of water. If you see this happening, please report it to the Kirtland Police Department at 440-256-3333.

Anyone who violates this ordinance may be subject to a fine.

NEWS FROM EMERGENCY SERVICES

Kirtland Fire Department Receives State and Federal Grants

On June 23, 2017, the Kirtland Fire Department was awarded the "Assistance to Firefighters Grant" in the amount of \$73,900 to purchase equipment for the department.

A new LIFEPAK 15 cardiac monitor with Capnography, Pulse Oximetry, Blood Pressure Monitoring and 12 Lead capability was purchased and will be used in our new ambulance, a 2017 McCoy-Miller medium-duty unit based out of Station #2.

Two additional Blood Pressure monitoring components will also be added to our current LIFEPAK 15 units, making all three units identical.

A new Lucas Chest Compression System will now be carried on our Command Vehicle. The Lucas Device is used to provide high quality CPR to cardiac arrest victims, thereby, improving the chances of a successful resuscitation. The device also improves firefighter's safety while working in the back of the ambulance, allowing firefighters to remain belted in, while the Lucas Device maintains chest compressions.

A new RAD 57, Carboxyhemoglobin monitor will also be carried on our Command Vehicle. This unit will be used to monitor victims exposed to high levels of Carbon Monoxide, as well as monitor firefighters exiting hazardous condition areas.

Seven new sets of firefighter turn-out gear will also be purchased, replacing outdated or damaged gear. Thanks to the State of Ohio EMS Grant, we purchased a new AED for our Command Vehicle. We were also able to place an AED at the Kirtland Recreation Park. The AED is mounted on the concession stand and is available for cardiac emergencies at the park.

A Message from Our New Chief

I would first like to say thank you to all of the residents, City Council, city employees, and Mayor Davidson for the warm heartfelt messages, thoughts, and cards I have received since being appointed the new Chief of the Kirtland Police Department. I stand firm in my belief that the people of the City of Kirtland are head and shoulders above others when it comes to care and concern of our fine city.

I would like to express that although there is a "New Chief in Town", I can personally guarantee you that my core values and ethics have not changed. I have proudly served this community for over the 22 years and will continue to do so. Although some may feel drastic changes are inevitable, the prior leadership instilled by retired Chief Baumgart continue to have a profound impact on the way the Kirtland Police Department will continue to perform their duties.

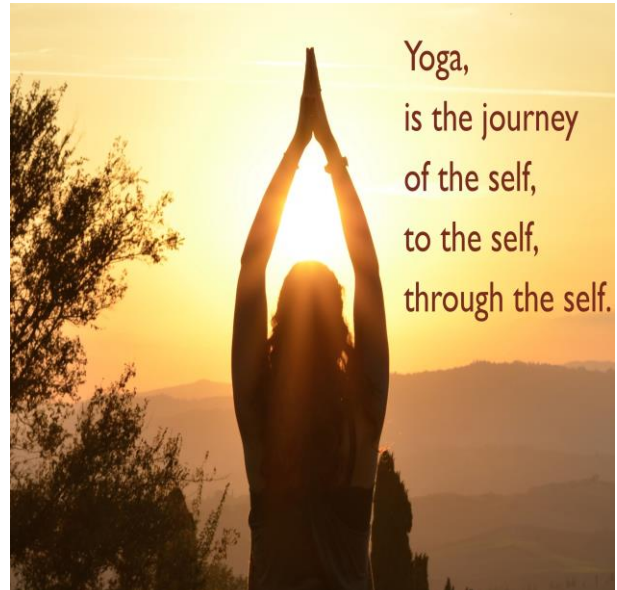
